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## Life as a Being: Miche Ann Walsh and the Planet's Health

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Miche Ann Walsh was with her San Diego teammates at her completing weekend of Landmark Education Team, Management and Leadership Program (TMLP). It was April of 2010 and news about the BP Oil Spill in the Gulf of Mexico was spreading throughout the world. It was the largest marine oil spill in history and an unprecedented ecological disaster, so Miche took a stand. "I got, in that moment, that my life was to be used for a greater thing, I realized I had to do something about it, because it was bigger than me.... I saw that I was really going to be a contribution and it was worth packing things up, leaving my home, calling everybody, creating teams, and bringing into play all of my commitments towards a healthy planet. I knew that no matter where people stand they could make a difference".

Miche took her car and set on her way across the US, leaving completely behind her, life as she had known it. She was on her way to setting up TEAM Gulf. She had been on a similar road in the past, just one year before the spill. In 2009, when starting her TMLP Program, Miche set up a "game" called GP2 Project, aimed "To clean up the 'Great Pacific Garbage Patch' and to create a healthy and vibrant Ocean and Planet right now".

It became a multi-million dollar project, and under her leadership global green expeditions were placed together to start tackling the problem. When the oil spill happened, Project GP2 already had a life of its own that, of course, continues today. That experience allowed her to go and create a difference for the Gulf. With the support of her TMLP teammate Mark, they created the project Team Gulf. This time, this project and non-profit organization is dedicated to empowering leaders and fostering teamwork in the cleanup of the Gulf oil spill. And with it, they created a game making available a new consciousness for awakened leadership causing responsibility and action.

Miche says "If you simply keep in action you can make a difference, we just have to give up that it is too big to do anything about it". Listening to Miche, the word team acquires a new and broader dominion. With Team Gulf in mind, she left San Diego by herself, alone in her car, after her marriage had just ended. "I drove across 4 states and ended in New Orleans. There I began to meet people. I had met a woman from Colorado on line, who wanted to help. She flew to the Gulf of Mexico. I told everybody why I was there, I even started donating

T-shirts I had, and a park ranger let me stay with him for six weeks to start working”.

Miche is definitely team, and teams get created around her. She intensively used social networks like Facebook and Stay Classy Fundraising Network, and was using these networking tools to be continuously updating all her friends and persons in her community that were supporting her in this endeavour. She looked for and support for places to stay, food, donations, wetsuits, even treatment for the teams she created to be cured and detoxed due to chemical exposure!

“With the park ranger, we wanted to collaborate to find the solution to clean up the Gulf, so we started to put people in teams. Within three months we had created 42 different teams of people from all types of backgrounds and expertise working together: artists, photographers, biologists, life wild rescuers, reporters, and people simply wanting to make a difference”.

How does one cope with such a commitment everyday? Well, Miche knew she could make a difference. “I know what I have to give up on-goingly... it was too big to give up all at once. I have to keep giving up my fear, the resignation (mine and others), our sense of thinking we are powerless... generations of fishermen, oil workers... I just had to keep trusting and taking action. I also had to deal with reality, deal with people’s fears and keep standing for something to be possible.”

On September 19, 2010 the well was officially sealed. One week before, Miche was at a gas station and a man walked up to her. He introduced himself as the person supplying the equipment to BP for capping the oil spill. Miche had a conversation with him and could see that his commitment was to stop the spill as soon as possible, so she just listened to him and asked him what he saw was working and not working. She was in the conversation. He saw through the conversation that he needed more people working together for a common solution.

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Of course there are still unmeasurable actions to take place in order to restore the Gulf’s health. But, as Miche says, “Team Gulf managed to be a major resource for people and volunteers to come from places far away such as Colorado, New Zealand, San Diego, Chicago, Madison, and Austin, Texas, to get on ground zero to see for themselves what can be learned from disasters that threaten our water and coastlines. Together, people from all over the country and the globe made a difference whether that be from rescuing an oiled crab, abandoned & malnourished cats and dogs (from gulf families that couldn’t afford to care for their animals anymore),

creatively seeking out partnerships to do testing 40 miles away from the Deepwater Horizon, producing a documentary, wading chest high in the Gulf of Mexico oiled waters to monitor exposure of oil on birds, to supporting the first testing of a bio-friendly oil cleaning solution”. The goals that Team Gulf achieved made people know they could make a difference. Miche, as a TMLP graduate was looking to empower leadership and she enrolled more than 1000 people into participating.

Today, the Garbage Patch Project at the Pacific is an ongoing and growing endeavour with its source in California. In Louisiana, the park ranger is still running the Gulf restoration network. Miche Ann has created teams on both shores of the U.S. to work for the health of the oceans. She is now back in California, though in L.A. living a new life. She found the love of her life in Louisiana, her soul mate as she puts it. “By doing what I was meant to do, giving my word and honouring that word, I ended up following my heart and finding my partner.” They are now creating a life together and Miche is looking for new opportunities. She is taking on dealing with the condition of her finances and is considering becoming an optometrist. No one in her family has ever gone to college and she would love to be the first. Miche is currently focusing on getting financially stable, dealing with healthcare, planning her pension, and saving.

A super woman? No, definitely not. Miche is a woman living the truth of who she is. Yes. And who she is, is the possibility of leadership ensuring a healthy planet. She might be an optometrist, purchase the groceries, go to the cinema, and build her loving relationship, while the Garbage Patch at the Pacific and the Oil Spill at the Gulf continue to be dealt with. And, for sure, the next time there is an environmental disaster, you will find Miche Ann Walsh making a difference, creating teams and showing others that they are much more powerful than they ever thought possible.





## Students Creating Futures

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Can you imagine what the world would be like if there were high schools where the students were treated as equal members, as part of a team, involved in creating remarkable futures for themselves? Where, when a student is confronted and reacts, there is no repercussion, no disciplinary action, no principals called? Instead, the student is allowed to leave, think about what happened, and return to the classroom ready once again to participate on the team.

Through Gale Holmlund's participation in Landmark Education's Team Management and Leadership Program, she designed a Game in the World where she has been able to create such a model in an "urban subur-

ban" community, just outside the inner city of Chicago. "Typically," says Gale, "the apathy of the students is so enormous they don't do their homework. In this structure, more work is being handed in. The students are realizing the connection between their grades and their futures, and are engaging in their classes like they matter."

For achieving her Game's goals, she set up a team, which involves two school administrators, the students, and Gale herself. They engage in conversations to discover what they can do, and how she can assist them, to create a future for themselves. Gale sees her 125 students in five classes, five days a week. "My school is Chicago suburban... Most of the students come from gang-type neighborhoods. Members of their families have been lost to gang violence. These are kids of parents who worked their butts off to get the families out of the inner cities."

The kids have created their own supportive groups, bugging each other to do their homework—without outside encouragement. It is a game where everyone wins—and "winning" is getting an "A", "B" or "C" grade. Gale points out, "This is fairly radical. They've been aiming for mediocrity their whole lives."

As part of the game, they created a field trip to a junior college, overcoming objections along the way, "By writing persuasive essays, asking the administrators to re-consider, as my first request was flatly refused," Gale explains. The administration not only said yes, they actually found an additional teacher to go on the trip. "For the students, college was something not attainable. As a result of the field trip, the kids were able to get a sense that maybe they could do it. It created a possibility for the kids that had not been there before."

Things do not always come easily. Gale remembers, "I wanted more literacy materials; I wanted 30 copies of

Newsweek magazine. The cost is \$750 for a six month subscription, and there was/is no money. I sent a well written e-mail to friends and families outside of the school district, and raised \$900.” She put herself in action and each of the students wrote a thank you letter to the people who contributed.

“Now, all the students take an issue of Newsweek home, one night a week, for one night. We rotate all the magazines through all 125 kids each week. It’s the real language of the real adult world. These are kids whose sense of geography or government is non-existent. They do various assignments on the material in the magazine. The important thing is, they read more of the magazine.” Gale has a commitment that her students have their skills ready for college, and this project is part of having that happen. Nobody is complaining about the Newsweek assignments; the students are intrigued by what is in the magazine each week.

Gale started this team-based project in August and has continued it for two quarters of the TMLP Program. The impact on the kids is evident; “They demanded weekly grade sheets. They said what they wanted and I gave them what they wanted: Team. Slowly, the kids are getting the idea of being partners.”

“...every moment they see my commitment and see I am invested in their success, they stay invested in their own success; they form the habits to keep them committed to their own success.” With the foundation laid, with partnership developing, with their experiences at the college, the students are making remarkable futures their reality.



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## Living The Dream

In the year since his marriage, Team Mexico participant Javier Rosas and his spouse, Mickey, have experienced a real breakthrough in their relationship.

“We realized we were playing only within the space of our own partnership,” declares Javier. “Giving up the idea of being selective about whom we spent our time with has made us present to being openly related to all others.”

So Javier created the Game of Living inside the possibility of building a network for opportunities to be present in, and have a relationship with, the world in connection with love, family, and home.

“The result for us is doing new things and experiencing, through our family and close friends, a new relatedness. Supporting our family members and asking for help as well as listening for it. Expressing our feelings more. Speaking ‘I love you’, ‘Thank you’, ‘You are special to me.’ Saying the words.”

The intention of Living is that every action he and Mickey create in every moment that they are together focuses on conversations about how everyone can create their dream. And the outcome is that people around this game are creating their life around what is important to them and fulfilling those dreams.

Each month, everyone around the Game of Living completes one dream they have by creating actions to complete those dreams. These dreams are accomplished through conversations with everyone about what is important – no holding back from anyone. For instance, Javier and Mickey planned to host a New Year’s party for ten guests. Forty people showed up.

Mickey’s sister decided, after a long time, to live on her own, and she now has her own place. An older sister has begun studying to be a bilingual secretary. Another sister has not seen her daughter for three years. This month, that sister travels to Chile where her daughter lives.

Other activities have begun showing up that are even more powerful than the activity or event originally created, as Javier shares. “Mickey and I planned a Christmas dinner for five friends and, as a result, twenty holiday guests arrived. Everyone being in committed relationships, a conversation began about how each of us had met. That conversation, in turn, opened a new conversation around recommitment to our partners.”

Joining Team opened up for Javier the distinction of conversations with “everyone”, creating the possibility for the Game of Living in this quarter of relatedness, Javier’s completion quarter. His interpersonal relation-

ship with Mickey has grown ever closer even as each has recognized their individual space. The couple has begun a conversation around creating their future, financially and in other ways, exploring what that future may look like in the coming years.

Currently, there are more than 300 playing the Game of Living in Mexico. Team, friends, family, and other Landmark graduates have been moved and inspired to participate with a continuing commitment to play the game. And Javier believes the Game of Living can bring a real sense of connection to the world.

“I see humanity being related as the purpose of being human. Living is effective when families are hungry to be together more and more frequently. They express their language of love by calling each other to express their caring. Immediately upon thinking about a loved one, the game is won each time a participant calls upon their ability to communicate in a meaningless way. In other words, communicating without attaching a meaning to their speaking. So creating a ‘meaningless’ future in communicating with family and friends can open up the possibility of, say, more people who stay in a marriage or committed partnership rather than giving up on the relationship.”

Javier, raised in Venezuela and having lived in Chicago, is present to the realm of living where family and home is where you are being and who is with you rather than a geographic location or physical surroundings. And living a dream isn’t necessarily some enormous long-term ultimate goal.

“Dreams may be something little that you want to accomplish, and yet they are dreams to fulfill. Small details can create a realm within which dreams can be fulfilled no matter the ‘size’.”

Javier believes he and Mickey are living inside their natural desire to be together while playing at and completing what they really love by including everyone in their conversations. In other words, they’re living their dream.

Animal lovers, unite! Rebecca Godo, Team Detroit, has created a game for all to play, be they animal lovers or animal not so much'ers. Everyone in the conversation is inspired by the genius of this game.

Rebecca loves animals and doesn't relish the idea of any animals forced to survive out in the elements. "I want all animals to have permanent and loving homes. However, that can't happen until we get the pet population under control." Rebecca sees a far-reaching piece of her game as "Worldwide animal population control, with municipalities all working together. Pet population control then becomes one HUGE worldwide community effort."

There are too many cats on the streets with no homes to go to. And many of us have experienced the disturbance of cats at the height of the mating game, a high-pitched screech that mimics a crying baby. Rebecca, as a result of her participation in Landmark's Team Management and Leadership Program, has created a game to work in harmony with other organizations that provides peace for the cats as well as peace of mind for residents. "When cats are spayed and neutered, the noise, odor and other annoying behaviors associated with mating cats is reduced," says Rebecca.

For her game, Rebecca created the possibility of generosity, love and gratitude. Her intention is an organization, Project Kitty Connect. And the outcome is people and animals everywhere experiencing uncondi-

tional love, care and compassion. All involved in this game find themselves empowered to live fully self-expressed in the realm of wild animal caregiving.

"We're making a difference in the community," Rebecca reports. "We trap live animals and take them to veterinary clinics to be neutered or spayed. After the animals have healed, they're taken to a caregiver in the area near where they were originally taken." Rebecca explains that the caregivers then provide food and water for these wild felines, called feral cats.

Rebecca continues. "There's an overpopulation of cats in the United States. When an animal goes to a shelter, the state or city has to pay for the care of the animals until they are euthanized. This causes overcrowding in shelters, and the expense of euthanasia of the feral cats." Through Rebecca's non-profit Project Kitty Connect, teams raise money for continuation of the cause, spread the Kitty Connect message so that more cats can be treated, and generally empower people to understand that they can make a difference in this way.

Rebecca pleads her case with passion. "Cats are territorial. What typically happens in an area where there are

many feral cats and a food source, is the cats will occupy a certain territory and not allow any other cats to move in. When a group of cats are all removed at one time, it's called a vacuum effect. If it's a natural attrition, others cats don't come in. In a managed colony, if a new cat moves in, it is taken out to be fixed. This is part of our Trap-Neuter-Return policy.

"We work with veterinary clinics who charge us \$25 per cat to spay or neuter. That cost includes a rabies vaccine. The normal charge is usually much higher, approximately double what they charge us.

"Team is so important, because people who take on the responsibility of feeding and looking out for these feral cats are powerless by themselves. As individuals, they don't have the resources. They don't have traps, access to vets, transportation, post-surgery care, fundraising, and on and on. So Team is essential in this game."

One way in which the teams are working together to raise money for Project Kitty Connect is a Texas Hold'em poker tournament. A required gaming license application is in the process of being filed with the first tournament scheduled for July 2011 in Redford, Michigan. Another planned fundraiser is a calendar that is being created. Rebecca will appear each month with a different look and with a different cat.

In Rebecca's Game in the World, "Everything is possible with Team. When people love animals and their hearts go out to them, they are empowered as part of this team and find power they weren't aware they had before. They find the resources to play full out, and create powerfully to be supported in, what they need to do to express their love and care and expression of the animals.

"This empowerment is what the teams come away with in playing this game together. We see what is possible. We feel the power. And we empower others to listen for the difference they can make. It really is life changing."

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## One Great Neighborhood: The Power of Two Women

When Jenina Lepard knocked on Cecilia Rossiter’s door last year, the two women had no idea that they had the same commitment to being responsible and knowing how one can make a difference in the world.

Cecilia shares, “We became friends. Jenina’s Bahá’í faith demands members to be in communities and have communities work for everybody with nobody left out. She had the desire to create a strong, vibrant neighborhood, and I wanted to build a community where I lived. Therefore, I created a Game in the World, supported by my participation in Landmark Education’s Team, Management and Leadership Program, where I was committed to creating community within our neighborhoods.”

Their conversation created the Great Neighborhood. In the past year, their communities came together organizing dinners once a month, summer picnics, and other events. Bahá’í classes are held for children and adults, as well as weekly meetings. The possibility of the Great Neighborhood Game is being in communities, causing communities to work, with the world being unified in this time and place.

What’s even more inspiring about this Team is that Cecilia and Jenina actually live on opposite sides of their Lincoln, Nebraska community, expanding on others-to-others communication and relatedness. Together, they see the potential of the approximately 250,000 Lincoln residents who live within hundreds of neighborhoods,

with each community taking on the Great Neighborhood foundation in diverse ways.

Jenina speaks lovingly about Cecilia as contribution. “Who could not connect with Cecilia? It goes beyond her ebullient personality and our common love of music. She is so giving, with a willingness to open up her home and serve as host to community events. Cecilia is interested in connecting hearts, especially when it comes to children in the neighborhood. Hers is almost a second home to them.”

“The outcome is my Great Neighborhood,” declares Cecilia, “The place and life where I live. My commitment is my neighborhood as my team”. From her participation in TMLP, Cecilia now realizes that her intention is being responsible for creating teams within communities, and being the connection for teams present and future, to see the nature of a team functioning and fully present.

Cecilia sees a Great Neighborhood that everyone wants to live in, where all members of the neighborhood are invited to play the game. A young person’s group has been created where they learn about acts of service to the community--recycling materials, picking up trash, pet walking, etc. Another enlivened response came from the neighborhood children who wanted to be waiters. Adults came in, taught them how to cook and how to serve, and the children made a dinner and served it.

Cecilia believes the key is being interested in listening to what is important to neighborhood residents.

“One neighbor looked at one of my rooms, which was a mess, and said, ‘Wouldn’t this make a great art room?’ In turn, that became a cleaning up of my entire house and turning that room into a bona fide art room. In addition, having people coming to my home inspired me to really understand what a clean, inviting house is, and they supported me in organizing myself.”

“Communication is alive with all members of the neighborhood. What was predictable before this were neighbors not seeing each other for six months at a time, like last winter. We liked each other, but we just didn’t have conversations. Weekly meetings are now causing conversations outside of meetings and people are gathering at other times for other purposes – the others-to-others connection that one can experience also from Landmark’s Power to Create Program. I live in a great neighborhood, and it’s important for me to acknowledge that. We are leadership for what a great neighborhood is.”

Adults at the evening meetings often come away with a small project they work on together. One resident, an auto mechanic, has helped a number of the other neighbors with automotive problems. Great Neighborhood Thursday nights even include honorary guests, those residents who, having moved away, still return for meetings.

Cecilia opens up about how TMLP training specifically has shown up, unexpectedly, in her game. “It’s shocking to have this heart’s desire and having someone else playing it, leading it. Shocking in a pleasant way. Not as easy as pie; my own commitment is to give up things. For Jenina and I, we’ve actually gotten the experience of ‘it’s not about us’ together; being of service and getting

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that. We both have outcomes and we are of service to each other’s outcomes. Our generosity shows and is also a model. We will not be stopped.”

Jenina concurs. “Bahá’í teaches that we are one human family. With integrity of coordinated efforts and with room for diversity in the approach, we are committed to building neighborhoods, having global support, and in turn, building a global community.”

I see that I am responsible for so much more than what I thought was possible,” Cecilia speaks calmly. “Things keep being added to my plate and I’ve gotten peaceful with not knowing how much I can really handle. Not knowing and being surprised. Not upset or dwelling about it; not even thinking about it.” She is letting life be what it is and living in that comfortably.





## Age Looks at Aging

In this fast paced world of extraordinary inventions, sophisticated travel, and high tech communication devices; we've lost touch with one of our most valuable resources.

Brian Braff noticed a missing concerning the way our society looks at our senior citizens. Despite the numerous articles, books and documentaries about the older segment of society, none were created from the vantage point of the people who were aging.

Brian graduated with a degree in economics from Berkeley in 1965 and from UC Hastings College of Law in 1969. After practicing criminal law for 20 years, he spent several years as a songwriter, signed to Warner-Chappell Music, but eventually found his way to what he truly loved - photography. Brian's interest in the subject of aging started long before joining the Team Management Leadership Program with Landmark Education. He knew that it would take a dedicated team effort to launch a game of this magnitude.

You might ask, "How does any one person alter the attitude of an entire populous?" Brian's answer was to start by listening. Since everyone drops in on this

planet by the same delivery system, experiences life's journey, seeks to grow and develop the heart's passions, it would be wise to seek the advice of someone who has traveled that road before. The wisdom and generously-shared life lessons of our elders are rich and valuable resources, available for the asking, in abundant supply. Brian created a Game in the World called Age Looks at Aging, the possibility of empowerment, dignity, full self-expression and communication in the world between people of all ages.

He assembled a team and started mining for the golden wisdom and untapped resources society has long ignored. The idea was to have the participants tell their own stories, sharing their experience of aging with the community directly through photos, writings and interviews. Through training, coaching and conversation, our aging citizens would take this project on as their own sharing what they were inspired to share in any way they chose.

Brian was surprised at some of the responses he received as he first introduced the project. "Who cares what we think?" was the response of many of the elders. Brian knew immediately what was missing. It was the respect and honor for those who came before us. It was the ingenuity, creativity, and courage of those lives that blazed the trail, set the stage, feathered the nest, and created the foundation for the abundant lives available. The 'Elders of the Tribe', as Brian describes, have been put away, pushed aside, and despite the desperate attempts to contribute, for the most part, their voices land on deaf ears.

One might think it unfair, disrespectful and an insult to treat our elders in this fashion. The true insult is to our society. The youth and future generations are the BIG losers. There is a reason why history repeats itself and

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a contributing factor could be society’s indifference and unwillingness to listen to the voice of experience.

In a pilot project at two assisted living communities in Santa Monica, CA, the results were astounding. Participants whose average age was over 90 took 2400 photos. Photos were displayed at two large and very well attended gallery showings, which featured readings of the participants’ own writings and excerpts of their interviews of each other.

Since then, Age Looks at Aging has grown into a much larger non-profit organization. The outcome of the mission is to completely transform the conversation on aging. The economic and social shifts in our society, family and community, to a great extent have contributed to the loss of this precious resource. The Age Looks at Aging project is returning them to the head of the table, where they belong.

Through the Internet, media, gallery and museum showings, a planned school program, and public appearances the Age Looks at Aging project is reaching out to the world recreating family and community.

Brian shared his vision and opinion: “Our elders need to speak, and we need to listen. I know this because I thought I had something to offer them when I started

this project, and then realized it was they who had something to give me.” This insight came quickly as he developed a relationship with 91-year-old Florence Horne, whose courage, wisdom, intelligence and humanity had her go from being “a ship without a rudder” to a powerful force in her community and beyond, speaking not only for herself, but for those “who have no voice.” Florence, the oldest member of the board of directors of Age Looks at Aging, passed away on February 4, 2011, but her light and legacy live on. “Through the lives of people like Florence, I quickly came to see that I needed what they had to offer me, and I am profoundly grateful for this opportunity.

## Wonderous Women

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Kelly Taing of Team San Diego has created a very interesting community...a community of hot wives. “The Hot Wife Club” is a community of women helping each other to live their dream life while having their own identity after marriage and children.

Ms. Taing was inspired to do this project when she began creating her dream life. While creating herself as a wife and mother, she became present to how other women struggle with their relationships and sometimes even let themselves go physically and emotionally. In her vision of her future self, Kelly chose to create her self as being a ‘hot wife’ and “The Hot Wife Club” was born. So far, the hot wives club has 80 members on Facebook.

The transformation can already be seen in those who have joined her group. Even though she never met team members beforehand, their rising confidence can easily be seen. The possibility of her project is transforming people’s lives and Ms. Taing shares: “ Its inspiring!”

“We teach all Wives, future wives and on the market again’s, how to tap into their inner beauty, create a workable environment around them and design their life the way they want it. When the man in your life sees you being the best YOU, you can be sure that he’ll fall in love with you all over again...But it starts with YOU!” The hot wife club features articles and provides coaching. Kelly insists “not about just looking good” but that it is about being beautiful inside, outside, financially and physically.

Now Kelly has more confidence and is courageous to pursue what works for her and not for others. Seeing women getting what they want has been the most fulfilling part of the adventure for her. She also asserts that she got courageous about her dream by facing her fears. Kelly admitted that all her life she avoided situations where she felt “I’m not good enough” or “I’m leaving you”. Today, as a business owner, she saw that wanting to please everyone did not work at all, and experiencing that was one of the biggest breakthroughs she got from being in the TMLP program.

Also, Kelly admitted that before taking the TMLP training she would have never imagined that someone would take on this project like their life depended on it, and reveals that it is unbelievable to her that she caused such greatness to happen. Today leaders around her are passionately supporting the project. The future of “The Hot Wife Club” [www.thehotwifeclub.com](http://www.thehotwifeclub.com) is to have a community of one thousand members and all of those women will be discovering and getting who they really are for themselves and the world.

In the meantime, this Hot Wife is participating in a figure competition! It requires a tight regime of working out, and eating well, that Kelly will carry on for years to come. The belief that “taking care of self first before taking care of everyone else” and that “the more you have to give to your self the more you have to give others....” is strong for this successful woman who shares her passion with the world.
